Browsealoud

Browsealoud helps to reduce barriers between the content on this website and our audiences who visit. The software adds speech, reading and translation support for those people with Dyslexia, learning difficulties, English as a second language and those who have mild visual impairments.

Features include:

- > Text-to-speech with a choice of reading speeds
- > Translates the web pages into 99 languages
- > Speak translated text aloud in a choice of 40 languages
- > A magnifying tool to help people who have visual impairments
- > MP3 generator which allows offline listening
- > A screen mask tool which blocks on-screen clutter, allowing readers to focus better when the text is being read

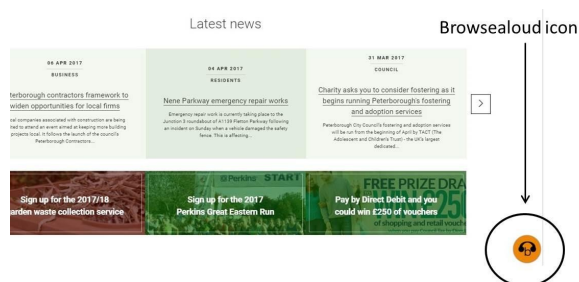
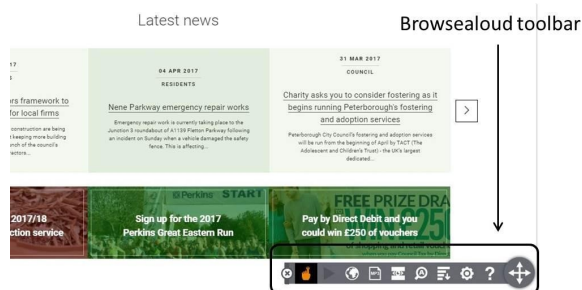
